Fact: The Franklin County Dog Shelter is Overcrowded

Did you know that in the spring and summer months, the shelter takes in as many as 50 dogs per day as strays and owner turn-ins?

As a county facility, the Franklin County Dog Shelter is unique in that there is no time limit on the adoption process. Dogs are allowed to stay on the adoption floor as long as it takes for them to be matched to just the right home. The shelter staff is committed to this kinder, more humane approach, despite the burdens that it places on our limited space and budget. However, their genuine love of dogs combined with a startling lack of space has caused our shelter staff to be very creative in managing a constant stream of incoming dogs.

Creative Solution #1

Creature Comforts to the Rescue!!!

A crippling side effect of overcrowding is the transmission of coughs and colds between the dogs. This results in a constant need for additional space in the infirmary. Creature Comforts Veterinary Care provides off-site kennel space and infirmary care to dozens of FCDS dogs each month. Once healthy (and adoption floor space is available) the dog(s) are returned to the shelter to begin their search for a new home.

Creative Solution #2

FCDS Foster care program: Foster Moms and Dads who love the dogs enough to let them go.

The foster care program, coordinated by Erin Frost, is made up of a network of FCDS staff, employees, volunteers, and other caring members of the community who open their hearts and homes to countless puppies and dogs each month. There are an average of 50-100 shelter dogs in foster care each month. The FCDS foster care program

offers dogs the opportunity to live full time in the homes with a person or family offering love, guidance, support, and sometimes a little training to needy shelter pooches. These dogs remain with their foster families for days, weeks, and even months until they are ultimately adopted into loving, permanent homes.
